UNIT OVERVIEW:

The purpose of this unit is to enable learners to develop and present a body of work based on theoretical and practical development and complex demands and contexts. The learners will be asked to plan, organise, execute and present their final major project to the public in consideration to appropriate exhibition formats and the impact of the audience.

INDICATIVE CONTENT:

This unit is pivotal for the progression and development of fine art studio practice as its promotes the design and execution of a coherent body of new work which articulates personal and creative ideas towards resolved exhibition outcomes.

Students will develop their studio work through the selection of appropriate media and with emphasis on their conceptual and theoretical interests. Critical debate and conceptual thinking are very crucial for this stage as the students will be asked to apply critical judgment and take decisions for better realization. They will spend most of their time in studios where they will progressively develop visual responses and discourses to self-set problems and questions of materials, concepts/meanings and methods of installation/exhibition.

Students will be working more independently in their studio at this stage with an ongoing guidance from their tutors(tutorials). The time in the studios is very important to help them develop a coherent, well-structured final work with consideration to personal questions, concepts, audiences and methods of installation/exhibition.

Tutorials are very crucial and important for this stage to help students execute, improve and evaluate findings according to their conceptual and theoretical intentions.

On successful completion of the unit, students will be able to:

- 1. Appropriate knowledge skills will need to be applied and to be developed through an extended fine art studio practice to develop a body of final work which comunicates personal creative ideas with appropriate use of findings and connections, leading to final outcomes for exhibition purposes.
- 2. The key characteristics will need to be defined, analyzed and evaluated accordingly aligned to historical, social, cultural and current fine art practice through a range of methods and techniques including, visits, artists-talks, online research, external study and writing.

- 3. Prepare to display your final instalation/work and use appropriate setup methods by sellecting and applying a range of materials, media and processes.
- 4. Support,reflect and challenge your discipline through the use of contexttual/research referencing, diverse forms, appropriate media and processes required for the final installation/ exhibition set up.
- 5. Organise and manage the exhibition-degree show by following deadlines, testing and rejecting processes materials and installation formats in appropriate time frames and manners.
